Resolution Template



This template provides a format for a resolution that your local PTA or council can adapt for your use. Simply update:

- Local PTA/PTSA or council name, number and logo
- Document footer
- Resolution title (accurate, clear, descriptive, and concise title limited to 40 characters)
- Year the resolution was adopted and amended if applicable
- Group that adopted the resolution (board of directors or membership) and year adopted (and amended)
- Whereas clauses (state the issue or concern and why the action in the resolved clauses should be taken – should be broad in scope - use clear and concise language with consistent name references and no acronyms - should have verifiable citations or current references, published no more than six years ago, for each whereas clause - if you plan to submit to WSPTA for consideration, there is a 10 whereas clause limit)
- Resolved clauses (action or solution to resolve the issue or concern should be the strongest part of the resolution if you plan to submit to WSPTA for consideration, there is a 4 resolved clause limit)

Template Format

Resolution Title

Adopted: 20XX (amended 20XX) by PTA/PTSA name and number membership (or board of directors)

Whereas, this is the part of the resolution that explains the issue or concern; and Whereas, each resolution should address only one issue or concern that is applicable to the body adopting it (local, district, state); and each of the whereas clauses should address only one fact, idea, or supporting argument Whereas, related to the issue or concern; and Whereas, each of the whereas clauses should have verifiable citations or current references, published no more than six years ago. Therefore, be it Resolved, that the resolved clauses propose a solution to the issue or concern identified in the whereas clauses; and be it further Resolved, that each resolved clause should address a separate action to be taken or solution proposed to resolve the issue or concern; and be it further Resolved, that the resolved clauses should stand by themselves and the action proposed should be

clearly understood without having to refer back to the whereas clauses.
