

Standing Rules

- 1. **Voting Credentials:** Only voting delegates with voting credential cards have the right to voice and vote. Lost voting credential cards will not be replaced.
- 2. **Voting on Top Five Issues:** Voting to determine the top five issues shall be by ballot. Voting delegates must be present and show their voting credentials to vote for the top five issues.
- 3. **Speaking in Debate:** A voting delegate wishing to speak in favor (for or pro) or against (opposed or con) an issue or motion may proceed to the appropriate microphone even before a motion is pending.
- 4. **Requests for Information, Parliamentary Inquiries, and Points of Order:** A voting delegate wishing to make a Request for Information, Parliamentary Inquiry, or raise a Point of Order must proceed to the "information" microphone. The total debate time clock will stop when a delegate is speaking at the information microphone.
- 5. **Recognition by the Chair:** When recognized by the chair, the voting delegate will give their name, and the name of the local PTA or council represented or WSPTA position held.
- 6. **Length of Speeches:** No voting delegate shall speak for more than 90 seconds at a time or more than twice on any pending item of business.
- 7. **Total Debate Time per Main Motion:** Total debate time for each main motion shall be a total of twelve (12) minutes. The total time clock will stop for all matters and replies at the "information" microphone. The total time clock may also be stopped by the chair as needed.
- 8. **Debate Process without Motions:** After the introduction of a main motion, one voting delegate may speak in favor and one voting delegate may speak against the motion before any amendments are proposed. The chair will alternate recognition between the 'for' and 'against' microphones. If no voting delegate has approached the 'against' microphone and there are no amendments or other motions, the vote on the main motion will be taken without further debate.
- 9. Motions to Amend Issues and Resolutions, Other Main Motions, and Secondary Amendments:
 After the introduction of a main motion, a voting delegate wishing to make any other main motion (such as to postpone, refer, or table) or to propose primary or secondary amendments to issues or resolutions, must submit the motion in writing on a motion form available from the microphone tables, proceed to the "motion" microphone, and wait to be recognized by the chair. When a



resolution is presented for debate, only the shaded boxes of the resolution, as shown in the Voter's Guide, are open for discussion and amendment.

10. **Debate Process with Motions to Amend:** If an amendment is proposed, the chair will recognize one voting delegate in favor of the amendment (the motion maker) and one voting delegate against the amendment before a secondary amendment may be proposed. The chair will alternate recognizing speakers at the "for" and "against" microphones, continuing until either the total debate time has expired, or no further speakers wish to speak.

At the conclusion of the first speech in favor of the amendment, if no voting delegate has approached the "against" microphone and there are no secondary amendments or other motions, the vote on the amendment will be taken without further debate.

If the amendment is adopted, the main motion will be considered as amended, and debate will resume on the amended main motion. If the amendment fails, debate will return to the main motion in its original formThis process will repeat for each subsequent amendment until all amendments have been processed or the total debate time for the main motion has expired. If time remains after all amendments have been addressed, debate on the main motion (as amended or as proposed if the amendment fails) will resume until the total debate time expires. When no further voting delegates wish to speak, or the total debate time has expired, the vote on the main motion will be taken.

11. Debate for Resolution Resolve Clauses:

Debate will proceed by resolved clauses, addressing one clause at a time in the order they are presented. Once a resolved clause has been debated and amendments, if any, have been processed, the next resolved clause will be considered. If no voting delegate has approached the "against" microphone and there are no amendments or other motions, the vote on the main motion will be taken without further debate.

12. **Voting Process:** Voting delegates must show their voting credential cards when voting. During a counted vote, no one may enter or leave the meeting room.
